How to Get to Coronado Beach



Coronado Beach is located on Coronado Island, just across the bay from downtown San Diego, California. Getting there is simple, with multiple convenient transportation options whether you're driving, flying, or using public transit.

By Air

The nearest airport is San Diego International Airport (SAN), located about 8 miles (roughly 20 minutes) from Coronado Beach. By Car

By Public Transit

You can also use San Diego's Metropolitan Transit System (MTS). Take the Blue Line Trolley to the 12th & Imperial Transit Center, then transfer to Bus 901, which goes directly to Coronado. It's a budget-friendly and eco-conscious option for travelers without a car.

Once you are on the island, getting around is easy. Many visitors rent bikes, e-bikes, or golf carts to explore the scenic streets, local shops, and waterfront paths. The compact layout makes it ideal for walking and cycling, giving you a laid-back beach-town experience.
