

Sohier Park in York, Maine: Complete Visitor Guide

Sohier Park is one of the most scenic coastal viewpoints in New England. Located in the charming seaside town of York, this oceanfront park is best known for offering the most iconic view of Nubble Lighthouse, officially called Cape Neddick Light. combination of rugged granite rocks, deep blue waters, and the historic lighthouse makes this one of the most photographed locations in the state.

Location and Directions Sohier Park

Sohier Park is located in Cape Neddick, a coastal village within the town of York. The park sits at the southern tip of the Cape Neddick peninsula, directly facing the Atlantic Ocean and the famous Nubble Lighthouse. Its address is commonly listed as 11 Sohier Park Road, York, Maine, making it easy to find using GPS navigation.

How to Get to Sohier Park

If you are driving from Interstate 95, take Exit 7 in York and follow signs toward Route 1 South. From there, turn onto Nubble Road and continue until it ends at Sohier Park. The drive from downtown York Beach takes only a few minutes, while the trip from Portland, Maine is about one hour. Visitors traveling from Boston can reach the park in approximately 90 minutes by car.

Public transportation options are limited, so having a vehicle is the most convenient way to visit. Rideshare services may be available in peak summer months, but availability can vary.

Nearby Landmarks
