1. Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum

No museum captures the spirit of Nashville better than the Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum. The exhibits include original guitars, gold records, military uniforms, personal photographs, stage costumes, and heartfelt letters that reveal both his musical legacy and personal life.

 **Visitor Tip:** Purchase tickets online if you are visiting during weekends, as the museum is one of downtown Nashville's busiest attractions.

3. Frist Art Museum

Even visitors with little interest in automobiles often find the collection surprisingly entertaining because of its diversity and unusual exhibits.

Often called the “Home of 1,000 Hits,” RCA Studio B is where legendary artists including Elvis Presley, Dolly Parton, Roy Orbison, and the Everly Brothers recorded many of their greatest songs. Rather than a traditional museum, visitors join guided tours that explore the studio's rich musical history while standing inside the very room where countless chart-topping records were created.

It is one of Nashville's most authentic music experiences and an essential stop for fans of American music history.

 **Visitor Tip:** Tours often sell out during peak travel seasons, so book your tickets in advance.

10. The Parthenon Art Museum
