

Best Things to Do in San Francisco for First-Time Visitors

This guide will help you decide what to prioritize, how to organize your sightseeing, and which experiences are worth making time for on your first trip.

12 Best Things to Do in San Francisco for First-Time Visitors

These are the experiences worth prioritizing when visiting San Francisco for the first time. You do not need to see all 12 in one trip. Choose the attractions that best match your interests and organize them by location.

1. See the Golden Gate Bridge

No first trip to San Francisco feels complete without seeing the Golden Gate Bridge. The bridge is the city's most recognizable landmark and one of the first places many visitors put on their itinerary.

You can experience it in several ways. Walk or bike across part of the bridge, visit the Welcome Center, or enjoy the views from the surrounding Presidio. The Presidio also offers several scenic viewpoints, including Battery East Vista and the Golden Gate Overlook. Walking or biking across the bridge is another memorable option, although the full span is 1.7 miles long.

First-time visitor tip: You do not have to walk the entire bridge to enjoy the experience. Even walking part of the way gives you impressive views of the bay and city.

Try to combine your visit with the Presidio, Crissy Field, or another nearby attraction rather than making a separate trip later.

2. Visit Alcatraz Island

Alcatraz Island is one of the most memorable experiences in San Francisco. The former federal prison sits in the middle of San Francisco Bay and offers a combination of history, dramatic scenery, and views back toward the city.

The island has a much deeper story than its famous prison years. It has also served as a military site and was the location of the 1969 occupation by the Indians of All Tribes, making it an important place for understanding several chapters of American history.

A ferry ticket is required to visit, and the National Park Service strongly recommends booking in advance. The ferry ticket includes transportation and the cellhouse audio tour, and the visit generally requires several hours of your day.

First-time visitor tip: If Alcatraz is at the top of your list, book it before finalizing the rest of your itinerary. Then plan your other activities around your ferry time.

3. Ride a Historic San Francisco Cable Car

San Francisco's cable cars are more than transportation. They are one of the city's signature experiences.

Riding a cable car gives first-time visitors a chance to experience San Francisco's famous hills while traveling through some of its most recognizable areas. It is also an easy way to add a classic San Francisco experience to a sightseeing day.

The city's official visitor information describes the cable cars as one of its iconic attractions and provides guidance on routes, tickets, boarding locations, and avoiding long lines.

First-time visitor tip: Try to ride the cable car as part of your journey between attractions rather than treating it as a separate activity. This can save time while still giving you the experience.

4. Explore Fisherman's Wharf and Pier 39

Fisherman's Wharf is one of San Francisco's most famous visitor areas and remains especially popular with first-time travelers. The waterfront district is home to restaurants, shops, attractions, Bay views, and the famous sea lions near Pier 39.

It is also conveniently located near several other popular attractions, making it easy to include in a first-time itinerary.

You can spend a few hours walking around the waterfront, watching the sea lions, enjoying views of Alcatraz Island, and exploring nearby piers. The area is touristy, but for many first-time visitors, it is still part of the classic San Francisco experience. San Francisco Travel specifically identifies Fisherman's Wharf as an area closely associated with the city for both first-time and returning visitors.

First-time visitor tip: Combine Fisherman's Wharf with Alcatraz, the Embarcadero, or a cable car ride to make the most of your time in this part of the city.

5. Spend Time in Golden Gate Park

Golden Gate Park is much larger than many first-time visitors expect. With gardens, museums, open spaces, walking paths, and cultural attractions, it is not the type of place you can realistically explore completely in a single short visit.

Instead, choose one or two experiences that interest you most.

Popular options include the Japanese Tea Garden, California Academy of Sciences, de Young Museum, and simply walking through parts of the park. Golden Gate Park is also regularly highlighted by the city's visitor resources as one of San Francisco's major green spaces and attractions.

First-time visitor tip: Do not try to visit every attraction inside the park. Choose your priorities and allow enough time to enjoy them without rushing.

6. Walk Through Chinatown

San Francisco's Chinatown is one of the city's most fascinating neighborhoods for first-time visitors. Its busy streets, traditional architecture, restaurants, markets, and historic character make it much more than a quick photo stop.

Spend some time walking beyond the main entrance gate and exploring the neighborhood at your own pace. Stop for dim sum, browse local shops, or look for quieter streets away from the busiest tourist areas.

Chinatown works particularly well as part of a sightseeing day because of its location near other central attractions.

First-time visitor tip: Visit around lunchtime or dinner if you want to combine sightseeing with a memorable food experience.

7. See Lombard Street

Lombard Street is one of San Francisco's most recognizable sights, famous for its steep, winding section and colorful landscaping.

First-time visitor tip: Pair Coit Tower with North Beach or the Embarcadero rather than making a separate trip across the city.

9. Visit the Ferry Building and Walk the Embarcadero

The San Francisco Ferry Building is a great place to experience the city's waterfront while also enjoying food and local products.

Located along the Embarcadero, it can easily be included in a sightseeing route between the waterfront and downtown. Spend some time exploring the building, then continue walking along the bay for views of the Bay Bridge and passing ferries.

This is also a good place to slow down after a busy morning of sightseeing.

First-time visitor tip: If your schedule allows, combine the Ferry Building with a waterfront walk toward Fisherman's Wharf or another nearby attraction.

10. See the Painted Ladies at Alamo Square

The Painted Ladies are among San Francisco's most photographed homes. The colorful Victorian houses are set against a recognizable view of the city skyline, making Alamo Square a popular stop for first-time visitors.

The attraction itself does not require much time, but the area works well as a relaxed break between larger activities.

First-time visitor tip: Bring a coffee or snack and spend a little time enjoying the park rather than treating the Painted Ladies as a five-minute stop.

11. Explore the Mission District

For first-time visitors who want to experience a different side of San Francisco, the Mission District is worth adding to the itinerary.

The neighborhood is known for its colorful murals, diverse food scene, historic character, and lively atmosphere. It also offers easy access to Dolores Park, where visitors can relax and enjoy views across the city.

The Mission provides a useful contrast to San Francisco's major tourist landmarks. Exploring neighborhoods like this helps you understand why the city is known for much more than the Golden Gate Bridge and waterfront attractions.

First-time visitor tip: Plan your visit around food. The Mission is a great place to take a break from sightseeing and enjoy one of the city's most distinctive dining neighborhoods.

12. Explore the Presidio

- **Couples:** Golden Gate Bridge, the Presidio, Ferry Building, and scenic neighborhoods

- **Food lovers:** Chinatown, the Mission District, Ferry Building, and North Beach
- **Travelers with limited time:** Golden Gate Bridge, cable cars, Fisherman's Wharf, and one additional neighborhood

The goal of your first trip should be to experience the character of San Francisco, not simply check off the largest number of attractions.

What Should First-Time Visitors Prioritize?

If you only have a short time in San Francisco, these four experiences should be at the top of your list:

1. **Golden Gate Bridge**
2. **Alcatraz Island**
3. **A historic cable car ride**
4. **The waterfront, including Fisherman's Wharf or the Ferry Building**

After that, choose attractions based on your interests. Golden Gate Park is ideal for culture and outdoor activities, Chinatown is excellent for food and history, and the Mission District offers a more local and colorful side of the city.

Things First-Time Visitors Should Book in Advance

San Francisco has plenty of attractions that you can visit spontaneously, but a few experiences are easier to enjoy when planned before your trip.

Alcatraz Island

Alcatraz should be your highest booking priority. Ferry tickets are required to visit the island, and the National Park Service strongly recommends purchasing them in advance. During busy periods, tickets can sell out well ahead of time. Plan to spend at least two to three hours exploring the island.

Tip: Once you have secured your Alcatraz ferry time, organize your sightseeing around it. Fisherman's Wharf, Pier 39, and the Embarcadero are all convenient to visit on the same day.

Popular Tours and Experiences

Guided tours, food experiences, and special activities can also become busy during weekends and peak travel periods. If there is something specific you really want to do, booking ahead can prevent disappointment.

If You Have Three Days in San Francisco

Consider adding:

- California Academy of Sciences or another museum
- The Mission District
- Dolores Park
- Painted Ladies and Alamo Square
